Comments: As a father of two young children, an outdoor recreation enthusiast, and a resident of Spearfish, I am adamantly opposed to this exploratory drilling project.

I believe that the USFS has the responsibility to do everything in its power to protect our public lands for all to enjoy for generations to come. To this end, an Environmental Impact Study (EIS) must be done to fully understand the impacts of this project on local residents, tourists, hikers, bikers, bird watchers, fishermen, hunters, ranchers, snowshoers, cross country skiers, OHV's, anyone who enjoys the forest as it is now, and anyone who relies on access to clean water in the Spearfish Creek watershed. Upon analysis of the EIS, it will become clear that the best way for the USFS to protect our public lands will be to apply for a mineral withdrawal to include the Spearfish Creek watershed.

Protect our public lands. Stand against corporate greed that justifies its own self-interest by citing laws that were written before there were automobiles. This is not hyperbole. The Gilt Edge Mine is an active Superfund site and can be seen from the proposed drilling sites and has caused unrepairable damage to the Whitewood creek watershed.

The losers will be the untold number of people for generations who can no longer enjoy our National Forest the way it is now. On Monday, 6/5/2023 the Spearfish City Council, representing the residents of Spearfish who are likely to be the most affected by this decision, voted unanimously in support of a resolution opposing this project and called for an EIS to be conducted. Our voices must be heard.
