Comments: Potential Species of Conservation Concern (Lolo National Forest Comment)

As an avid recreationist on the Lolo National Forest, I do see that
it is important for species habitat, but it is also important to allow
access for hikers, bicyclists, and motorized enthusiasts. Hikers,
bicyclists, and motorcyclists need trail access and snowmobilers need
access for different varieties of terrain. These activities require
physical fitness and lead to a healthy lifestyle. If the number of
PSCC's keeps growing, it will lead to restrictions, access depletion on
the Lolo NF and dissension among user groups. While navigating the Lolo
NF, I have never seen anyone harassing wildlife or seeking to destroy
habitat.

Examples of human activity that occur in and over the Great Burn:

Every day airplanes fly over the Great Burn, Forest Service trail crews

and volunteer groups use powersaws to buck lodgepole out of trails in

the Great Burn during summer months. Wildlife seems to be thriving even

with chainsaw noise and airplanes flying over. Snowmobiles are not

allowed in the Great Burn, but this activity would be the least

impactive if allowed. Snomobile tracks disappear and no erosion occurs.

During winter months the elk and deer move to lower elevations for

forage. Mountain goats are prevalent on Landowner Mountain on the

Superior Ranger District especially winter months. They can even be

seen meandering on Trout Creek Road with snowmobile traffic going by.

Hopefully the Lolo Forest Revision will benefit wildlife and all user

groups.
