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Comments: As a resident of the neighborhood adjacent to the JHMR construction staging area, I would like to point out that the staging of equipment and storage of the old lift equipment and chairs from the Thunder Lift replacement during the summer of 2022 lasted well beyond the allowed construction timeline. The staging site was not screened at all from the residential area and the helicopter traffic from this project was extremely disruptive to the area.

Given all the proposed construction activities included in the current request, how will impacts to the residential neighborhood which is adjacent to JHMR's current construction staging area be mitigated? What is the construction duration for all of these projects? Will the Mountain Resort adhere to their conditions of approval related to construction staging?

Construction traffic through the residential neighborhood increased substantially during the Thunder Lift construction. This construction traffic was not supposed to travel through the neighborhood, but because it was more convenient for construction vehicles to travel this route, they often did illegally. How will the Forest Service ensure that JHMR will adhere to the construction parameters on the lands that the Forest Service does not control?

The vegetation in the staging area has not been fully restored from their last major construction activity and yet the Mountain Resort will surely ask to re-disturb this area and presumably expand their construction staging area given the breadth of proposed projects.

The JHMR current construction staging area does not reside on Forest Service property, but the impacts from the Forest Service's decision to allow or deny the proposed construction projects will greatly impact many families who live in this vicinity as well as wildlife which frequently travel through this area of Teton Village. How does the National Forest Service propose to address these concerns for adjacent lands that will undoubtedly be impacted if this request is approved?
