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Comments: It is well known by science, that we are currently in the sixth mass extinction event, precipitated by human actions, that are having significant consequences for myriad of wildlife species, as well as humanity, itself.

The Forest Service's Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement, evaluating the future of 10 sheep grazing allotments, supports the continued grazing by domestic sheep. This EIS, doesn't mention the number of native predators that are killed in the High Unitas Wilderness, just to protect sheep. It doesn't acknowledge the importation of invasive species attributed to domesticated sheep, nor does it consider the artificial competition those sheep bring for available forage, nor the diseases domestic sheep inflict upon native Bighorn sheep trying to reestablish in the wilderness area. Also, it fails to address water quality issues that cattle and domestic sheep produce.

I support the NO GRAZING option. Grazing should be curtailed to meet the public's interest in protecting the High Unitas Wilderness for wildlife and for an authentic Wilderness experience for visitors. Given all the tokenism the agency pays towards science, one would think it would implement meaningful practices for a change, that would help address the many crises we face today, rather than to continue to pander to special interest, whose only concern is their profits. Real concern for the ecosystem would be a refreshing change and might actually mitigate some of the impacts that have arisen from decades of abuse and mismanagement.
