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Comments: I am in favor of allowing Class 1 E-bike access and usage on the Syllamo Bike Trails on Sylamore Ranger District of Ozark St. Francis National Forest, and also the Womble Trail on the Caddo-Womble and Mena-Oden Ranger Districts of Ouachita National Forest. One critical element of Class 1 Ebike usage on these trails that is overlooked when evaluating impacts and the efficacy of allowing Ebikes, is the long-term, positive benefit of additional access and opportunities for off road (trail) biking for individuals with disabilities. Class 1 Ebikes are commonly used by individuals with various disabilities to assist with power transfer and pedal assistance to sustain momentum that would not be possible without an Ebike. People with disabilities already face a multitude of challenges in life, access to recreation mountain bike trail riding opportunities should not be another hurdle for them to cross. If access to trail riding opportunities on the 2 subject trails is not approved, people with mobility limitations will incur long-term direct, negative consequences by being excluded from trail riding opportunities on lands and trail systems that are fit for this type of inclusivity. By allowing Class 1 E bike usage on these 2 trail systems, additional recreation opportunities will be provided to those that already lack sufficient availability of trails and trail systems that accommodate their need for pedal assistance in order to enjoy the sport they love in the setting (mountain) and surface (trail) it was meant to be conducted upon. It's called mountain biking or trail riding for a reason. Simply put, there is never enough consideration of those with disabilities when evaluating whether to allow Ebike usage on trails throughout Forest System Land! This needs to change for all Federal land management agencies that have explicit directives to provide sufficient and reasonable recreation access and opportunities for all types of recreators, especially those with disabilities or handicaps as per the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)!
