I visited Grayson Highlands SP recently and loved the advertised bouldering trail with different V level path guides on trail signs next to rocks. As a conservationist myself, problems like erosion, sediment deposition, and destruction of fragile native vegetation and habitats, deeply concern me. At almost every park I've ever been to there has been visible, extensive vegetation and erosion damage, usually blocked off from visitors for care and regrowth. This is why it is so important to make sure climbing access is not only safe and practical, but very carefully designed, planned out, and built accordingly to mitigate weathering, consequences, and other disasters or destruction of natural resources. I notice many caves and caverns in particular (at least in the mid and southern Appalachians where I am) are frequently littered all over, have severely eroded slopes, and often old, illegal fire pits or other natural disturbances around them.
