Comments: I respectfully submit the following comments with regard to the proposed prohibition of bolting in national wilderness areas.

As a supporter and proponent of environmental protection I expect a more responsible approach to environmental stewardship from the U.S. Forest Service. It is imperative that our limited tax revenues for environmental protection and stewardship be spent more effectively. It has been well documented that this form of intrusion is harmful to songbirds and other forms of wildlife, AND is counter to the mandate of our US Forest Service system to establish and maintain the peace and tranquility of wilderness areas.
- 4.Education, prevention and enforcement of currently existing legislation such as bans on ATV use, grazing and overgrazing, illegal dumping, graffiti and numerous other abuses and misuses that are harming our wilderness areas.
