Comments: I am an avid climber and user of wilderness areas. I comment to ensure the responsible use of fixed anchors for rock climbing purposes remains permitted in wilderness areas. As a backcountry hunter, fisherman, and skier, I deeply appreciate and understand the need for wilderness areas without development. However, fixed climbing anchors such as bolts on alpine-style routes do not undermine this goal. I believe that bolts and fixed anchors should not qualify as installations and can, within reason, be a component of a sustainable wilderness experience. Bolts are minimally invasive, yet increase the safety margin for climbers by several magnitudes. With a bolt ban you will not see a reduction in climbing, only a reduction in safety. A prohibition on bolts would further be incredibly difficult to enforce and not a good use of federal resources. Of course, if someone is grid-bolting 300 bolts in a small area that probably does not meet the spirit of wilderness. Even then, if done without power tools the impacts are minimal. Certainly protection and anchor bolts on multi-pitch climbs should remain permitted in wilderness. Please revise the guidance to confirm the last 60+ years of precedent that fixed anchors can be used, replaced, and maintained in designated wilderness areas.
