Wilderness status is great but impermanent and fragile, easily reversed by exploiters winning enough seats in government to write new laws. As is, there is already apparently NO place farther than 21.5 miles from some sort of road in our lower 48! Too many want too many more roads and trails for gas or electric powered invasion.

Visitors into designated Wilderness are not supposed to be making manmade alterations of Wilderness. Period. I have already witnessed unmonitored horse packers overcrowding and invasively constructing eye sore "conveniences" and overgrazing and trampling in the Sierras, until supervision was switched to more adjacent offices and their invasive practices were reversed to restore better wilderness experience for all the other visitors.

Meanwhile, similarly, attitudes about "providing access" (including cellphone coverage) must change too. More respect and appreciation for all places and beings, vs. more myopic ANTHRONARCISSISTIC exploitation, whether any humans can get there or not because of remoteness and purposeful "LACK of man-made access".
