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Comments: I write as the former editor-in-chief of the biggest climbing media brands in the US, but as someone

who now works for an environmental conservation organization in Colorado.

I will try to be quick:

- --bolts are necessary to climb in some wilderness areas, but they can be abused
- --I would say bolts are abused in 15% of cases
- --a lot of bolts should be removed, the most egregious cases of them
- --the egregious use of bolts will likely only affect other climbers, and not general visitors seeking a wilderness experience
- --a bolt two hundred feet off the ground, out of sight, is not the same as allowing mountain bikes, for instance, into wilderness
- --bolts should be regulated
- --bolts should be chopped when there is availability for natural protection
- --bolts up face climbs should not be allowed, but the occasional bolt on a face should be allowed
- -- the wild should always take priority
- --often, boulderers in the backcountry, as with Emerald Lake, will have 100x times more impact than bolts on an alpine face
- --reviewing every current bolt would be impossible in the short term, but possible in the long term
- --do not be fooled, climbers do not always respect wilderness ethics
- --clean climbing should always be the norm and best practice in wilderness
