The Great Burn contains important habitat for threatened lynx, threatened wolverines, mountain goats, as well as over wintering elk, grizzly bears and deer. It goes against the best science to open this area to motorized vehicles as well as mountain bikes. This area has been proposed for wilderness status. Allowing motorized vehicles and bicycles into this wilderness gem is more of a political Kow Tow to a small but vocal user group that already has plenty of places to recreate without disturbing wildlife in one of the best last strong holds.
