Comments: When Congress passed the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA) to preserve and protect nationally significant public land in Alaska, unauthorized cabins had already been constructed on those federal lands. Then the Forest Service issued permits for the cabins; however, the permits would terminate upon the death of the last immediate family member of the original claimant. Now the Forest Service wants to remove restrictions from these permits.

I believe that cabins don't belong in designated Wilderness. The U.S. Forest Service should leave its policy unchanged and phase out ANILCA cabins, as was the original intent to protect and preserve these areas for current and future generations.
