This region includes a Wilderness area, a National Recreation Area, and large swaths of Lolo National Forest as well. As a child growing up in Missoula, my parents took me camping in this National Forest and Wilderness, and hiking and biking throughout the Recreation Area. I am a strong believer in the United States Forest Service's Multiple Use Mandate, or the idea that preservation, recreation, extraction, and other management authorities must be balanced by reasonable decision makers within the Service. I also strongly believe that some places just shouldn't be mined or logged, they are simply too important to a community. While the Rattlesnake as a region is large and varied, any extractive activity within this region's parts would result in a loss of aesthetic purity and character of untouched perfection.
