As representatives of the Southern Montana Climbers Coalition and Montana residents, we write to express our profound concern regarding the proposed policies by the National Park Service (NPS) and U.S. Forest Service (USFS) that could have detrimental effects on some of the most cherished climbing destinations in our state, including the Absaroka and Beartooth Mountains, Beehive Basin, the Humbug Spires, and Hyalite Canyon.

The proposed classification of fixed anchors, such as bolts, pitons, and slings, as "prohibited installations" in Wilderness areas poses a significant threat to our climbing community. Collaborative efforts are essential to finding solutions that balance conservation objectives with the preservation of our unique landscapes. The climbing community is committed to responsible stewardship and is willing to work together to address concerns without compromising the essence of our climbing experiences.

Montana's climbing routes are an integral part of our cultural and recreational identity. We urge you to consider the collective voice of our community and take decisive action to safeguard our climbing heritage for current and future generations.
