Comments: I would like to comment/object to the proposed development of the pasture spaces around Sweetwater Lake.

In the arid west I see pastures as a valuable resource to be protected and preserved for many reasons, and specifically "The Pastures at Sweetwater Lake".

1. To have a ditch-water irrigated pasture is a special thing in such an isolated and arid western local, as it is a valuable shelter and food source not only for horses, but many other species of plant and wildlife.

2. Pastures are the quintessential open spaces for wildlife habitat, calving areas, and hunting areas for birds of prey and other predators as they contain many species of rodents and small mammals.

4. Pastures capture rainwater and help to recharge groundwater sources, prevent evaporation, aid in soil health and carbon sequestration, and provide a green cooling of the area.

This will ease a potential safety issue with larger vehicles on the road, as well as reduce the Energy consumption necessary for transportation of hay from outside locations.

6. Seasonal horse grazing also adds to the nutrification of the pastures by depositing urine and manure which further aids in the natural cycles of regeneration in this ecosystem.
