Here are three reasons these purchases within the BWCA and the Conservation Fund lands within the Superior National Forest make sense to me:

Preserving Public Lands: This purchase avoids a potential land swap that could have shrunk the Superior National Forest and opened up vast swaths of area to extractive industries like logging and mining. Keeping these lands under federal protection ensures their preservation for future generations, my grandchildren and generations to come.

Expanding Public Access: As part of this agreement, the additional 17,000 acres of land outside of the Boundary Waters, held by The Conservation Fund, will also be purchased. Resolving Historical Conflicts: This purchase addresses long-standing concerns about School Trust Lands within the BWCAW.
