Rather than eliminating this body of water, efforts should be made to enhance and protect it alongside Keechelus Lake. Removing the pond could lead to unforeseen consequences that may not align with the goals of ecosystem restoration.

3. Lack of Conclusive Evidence Supporting Pond Removal:

The environmental assessment provided does not offer conclusive evidence that removing Gold Creek Pond will significantly benefit the bull trout population or the broader ecosystem. The pond has been part of the landscape for years, and its sudden removal could disrupt more than it restores. Without robust and clear evidence supporting this action, it seems premature to proceed with such a drastic measure, especially considering the potential negative impact on local wildlife, recreation, and the environment.

In conclusion, while I appreciate the efforts to improve and protect the natural environment in Gold Creek Valley, I believe the current plan does not sufficiently consider the needs of the local community and lacks strong evidence that the proposed actions will achieve the desired ecological outcomes. I urge you to reconsider the aspects of the project that involve altering Gold Creek Pond and to explore alternative approaches that would preserve the accessibility and environmental integrity of this cherished area.
