That "x" amount of land might not support "x" number of horses. Some questions need to be asked by the public, and BLM must provide answers.

We have all seen the brutal methods used to wrangle up wild horses throughout our country. Will press and public members be allowed to witness these round-ups so there is accountability with BLM's methods? How will the approach to gathering them change when there is an abundance of foals? It looks like nothing can be "free" any longer. We need to tame, kill, remove, and eliminate anything that is "free" instead of coming up with solutions. Wild Mustangs will not stop being Wild in their nature, meaning it will be virtually impossible to tame them and bring them into the domesticated world. I should know I had a rescued Mustang. Many other parties in the area mentioned have caused "environmental" issues. Humans, the LAWD, and now that some of their "environmental impact is being healed, we now need to protect it from the Mustangs suddenly. The Mustangs had to manage when we were destroying their land, and maybe it is time for us to manage how to save it for them.
