- 1) Stop cutting old-growth forest in the southern U.S. and elsewhere.

- 3) Do not allow forest managers to create exceptions to plans that preserve old growth. They should not be able to use their discretion to log old-growth and create new, young forests.
- 4) Make sure that the inventory and identification of old growth is scientifically sound. Make the process transparent, consistent, and open to public input. Involve researchers, ecologists and outside experts.
- 5) Require that mature forests be managed so that they become old-growth. The current Forest Plan is insufficient. Pay attention to the Daniel Boone National Forest in this regard.
- 6) Develop a plan for a network of old-growth forests throughout the southeastern U.S. using a sound scientific process. Think long-term and save the old trees, let nature take its course and stop all the cutting!
