Additionally, I propose that the Moses Mountain Recommended Wilderness be included in Alternative C to ensure comprehensive protection of potential wilderness areas under consideration.

Please consider these points carefully and recognize the importance of adopting Alternative C as the preferred action. By doing so, the Forest Service will demonstrate its commitment to preserving the natural beauty and ecological health of the Sequoia and Sierra National Forests for future generations.
