I do not take that for granted. The sole reason that I have called Prescott home for 14 years is because of the land and the pride we take in preserving it.

My name is Stephanie Griffin and I am reaching out in support of the Hassayampa River Mineral Withdrawal. Hundreds of miles of hiking and mountain biking trails adorn our forests and mountains. You can walk hours without seeing another human. The recreational opportunities here are second to none and I have traveled and recreated across the country in scores of towns similar to ours. None can compare to the access we have to the wilderness and the sense of freedom that brings. I can't imagine a day when I can't ride my bike through the pines to Froggie Falls, a favorite swimming spot for locals, or camp with friends at Wolf Creek. To threaten these opportunities is to threaten our identity as a community.

In addition to adversely affecting recreational access to this land, mining the Hassayampa riparian area will devastate rare and precious ecosystems for birds, frogs, salamanders, toads and trees that only live in this specific habitat.
