To begin, I will enter a statement about the Forest Service work/plans and why allowing these protections of public land and national forests in the state to be done away with are wrong and shouldn't be allowed:

These local voices accurately capture the important values that are shaping our region and our economy. I strongly urge the U.S. Forest Service to keep this momentum going and to work with our communities to prioritize fish and wildlife habitat, trails, recreation, and tourism management.
