Comments: First off, I just want to say that as a recreational user of the Flathead River system, I am happy to see so much care and outreach by the community, local outfitters and the forest service. Protecting our rivers for future generations is a large goal of mine as a local fishing guide.

I think that it is clear to many of us that the ORVs or "outstandingly remarkable values" are in danger due to overpopulation, lack of education and incorrect use/misconduct. I agree with most of the monitoring plan, and I am also a big fan of breaking up the forks into smaller management units. I think also starting the permitting on stretches that have the most fragile ORVs is also important. There are a few main points I would like to address:

- 1. OBTAINING PERMIT As a resident of Columbia Falls, I love the ability to wakeup in the morning and decide where we want to float. I think making the free permitting as user friendly as possible for myself and others is important. I think that putting the permits up on Recreation.gov is a great option.
- 2. EDUCATION I think in general, there is a lack of informed, educated river users, especially with the popularity of the Flathead Valley. This means putting all of the rivers rules and regulations on the permit webpage, as well as at boat launches, and anywhere else a recreational or commercial user may read them. There should be terms & Damp; conditions that need to be read by every angler, river user, or permit obtainee.
- 3. ENFORCEMENT- I see people on the river breaking rules & Damp; regulations almost every time I am on the water. I understand it all ties into budget and staffing, but I would love to see more enforcement whether that might be someone using treble hooks, parked on a gravel bar, or not having proper waste containment.
- 4. PAYMENT I have discussed this with many friends, and we all agree that we would pay a small fee for the permit (\$5 or less). This money could go towards educational resources, adding pit toilets, having more rangers to enforce regulations, etc.
