My name is Khailaya Hughes and I am writing as a concerned resident and student of the Black Hills region. As someone who is deeply connected to the natural landscapes of this area-both as a place of learning and as a source of peace and inspiration-I am heartbroken by the proposal of the Rochford Mineral Exploratory Drilling Project.

The Black Hills are more than just a geographic feature! They are a cultural, ecological, and spiritual sanctuary. The thought of industrial drilling invading this sacred and biologically rich environment fills me with sadness.
