Comments:

1. Don't issue the permit applicant a 20-year permit until it releases a Master Development Plan and it has undergone agency and public review and comment!
2. Do not try to pass the new owner's permit off as simply a "renewal" of the previous owner's 2017 permit.
3. Show the public the new owner's 2025 Operating Plan.
4. The repair, sizing and potential replacement of the sewage system must be a part of this permit process, not left up to taxpayers later.
5. Quit trying to shield the applicant and future plans from public scrutiny. Lay all the cards out on the table, THEN ask the public what it thinks as you prepare an Environmental Assessment in order to determine if a more intensive Environmental Impact Statement is needed to address significant impacts.
6. You cannot use a Categorical Exclusion from preparing an Environmental Assessment to break these connected and cumulative actions down into smaller baby steps.
