Comments: I'm writing from Oklahoma as a Native person deeply concerned about the proposed graphite

exploration project near Pe' Sla (Reynolds Prairie) in the Black Hills.

Even though I've never been there in person, I understand Pe' Sla to be a sacred site of immense importance to the Lakota and Dakota Nations. It holds a central place in their creation stories and ceremonial life, and it's recognized as a Traditional Cultural Property under the National Historic Preservation Act. Disturbing the land around it through drilling is not just a threat to the environment-it's a violation of Indigenous rights, treaty obligations, and the American Indian Religious Freedom Act.

This project puts multiple values at risk:

Cultural survival - No drilling should occur near a site this spiritually and historically important. This is about honoring the sovereignty of Native Nations and protecting what's sacred.

Water security - The headwaters of Rapid Creek are not a place to gamble with. Graphite exploration can release sulfides, leading to acid mine drainage that threatens drinking water and downstream ecosystems.

Wildlife and climate - Reynolds Prairie is one of the last intact meadows in the region, home to elk, pollinators, and other species. Heavy truck traffic and diesel-powered equipment will only further harm this fragile ecosystem and add unnecessary pollution.

I respectfully urge the Forest Service to:

Deny the exploration permit.

If not denied, require a full Environmental Impact Statement with robust tribal consultation throughout.

Extend the comment period by 60 days to give tribal governments and community members more time to respond.
