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Comments: The reason this whole assessment has been brought to the attention of the forest service and or BLM is because a group of sportsman feel that this assessment needs done to limit or lessen the amount of outfitters, hunting outfitters on public lands. When you did your survey a month or so ago you lumped all outfitters together as a whole. This does not adequately represent what us sportsman want. You cannot lump outfitters who take people snow machining, hiking, horse, riding, backpacking, taking pictures together with outfitters who take people hunting and fishing. When an outfitter takes somebody hunting or fishing, and they harvest an animal that animal is no longer Able to be hunted. all game animals in Wyoming are managed to be a certain population in certain areas. When we have an over abundance of outfitters which we for sure have there is undue pressure on all of the game, animals and all of the public land sportsman, who call Wyoming HOME for the reasons of hunting and fishing and enjoying the mountains. We have outfitters that not only have their outfitting camp that obviously can only hold so many people, but they overbook and then go to the forest service and plead for a Spike camp permit. That in itself proves the pressure that they have on the game animals because they have so many people that they feel that they can't keep them in the camp that they've already have permission to hunt on public land. Now they feel the need to go get spike camp permits. The public lands have multiple uses that all need to have checks and balances, and right now we are totally out of balance with the amount of hunting and fishing outfitters on our public lands that it is taking away from the quality of experience all sportsman should be able to have without professional competition

One more thing that needs brought up in the assessment is the access for the public to be able to harvest firewood to heat their homes in the winter. There is hardly a spot on the forest that you can find deadwood close to the road that does not have a "no firewood cutting aloud" sign in that area. You certainly do not have a problem taking money from individuals wanting to buy firewood permits, but you seem to have a problem, providing areas that are accessible to those buying the permits you have been trusted to manage the forest to the best of your ability, and in my opinion, you are failing miserably, and I hope you reevaluate the job that you are doing and represent the public better.
