- \* Strengthen, not weaken, protections for wildlife, mature and old forests, streams, and carbon storage.
- \* Include clear, enforceable standards with measurable objectives in the revised Forest Plan.
- \* Analyze and adopt the the system of forest reserves proposed for the Blue Mountains by several prominent scientists in the peer-reviewed paper by Law et al. in 2022 entitled "Strategic Reserves in Oregon's forests for biodiversity water, and carbon to mitigate and adapt to climate change."

- \* Reduce road densities that harm fish and water quality.
- \* Cut livestock grazing by 25-40% in sensitive areas; maintain closed allotments.
- \* Prioritize forests' role in storing carbon and buffering climate change, and
- \* Adopt a new model that protects ecological integrity and biodiversity
