Hello Elaine: I haven't been able to get to your recent meetings so I thought I would send this. I've am a volunteer with the Talking Talons group as well as with Friends of Sandia Mountains. I chaired the trails committee with the former group last year. I have a special interest in entering into a relationship with the forest service and others to develop a network of regularly maintained cross country ski trails in an area south of 10k parking. I have generally been happy with the progression of these efforts and intend to support the initiative moving forward.

I question the need to add designate more wilderness in the Sandias. On the west side, the forest service lands and the city's open space areas serve as a nice buffer between the city and the wilderness. Those users who prefer to avoid mountain bikers already have ready access to the wilderness. I believe that the areas under consideration should remain multiuse, with a general initiative to educate the public on how to share these areas compatibly.

I support the idea of wilderness for wilderness sake. A large portion of the wilderness is totally inaccessible as it is, and I think it should remain that way. Most users do not venture off of established trails on the west face of the Sandias, for example.
